# First-ever 'Fair Trade Fair' set for Sept. 24

Our community will come together Saturday, Sept. 24 from noon to 5 p.m. at the Municipal Building Plaza and on the block of Allen Street between Foster Avenue and Highland Alley to celebrate and to learn about a new form of doing business that is changing the world — fair trade.

The Fair Trade Fair is free and open to the public. It features live music by local bands, a coffee "cupping" (or taste evaluation) workshop and free samples of fair trade coffee, children's activities and story telling, educational displays by local non-profit organizations and student groups, and a sidewalk sale of both fair trade certified and locally made products.

Fair trade is a strategy for buying products from overseas in a way that guarantees farmers, craftsman, and laborers involved in getting us those products were paid a decent living wage. It is specifically designed to provide work and income for people who are currently living in poverty. Fair trade coffee, chocolate, tea, and "sweatshop-free" clothing are examples of products that are starting to find their ways into our economy and into households across the United States and around the world.

Did you know that the city of San Francisco recently passed an ordinance requiring all government purchases of uniforms and other textile products to be "sweatshop-free"? And that the British Parliament now serves only fair trade teas and coffees at all government offices and functions? As fair trade becomes more common in the marketplace, it becoming more like common sense. What helps the poor helps our economy in a fundamental way. It means more people have new and better buying power.

Bringing fair trade home to Centre County means creating local market interest and venues for fair trade products. Fair trade and other forms of globalization need to be balanced with concern for building strong local and regional economies that support a right to a livelihood for ourselves and our neighbors. Striking this balance will require that we become informed about the issues and engaged in public discourse, not merely as "consumers" but as people who vote, run households, work, make products, share our talents and care about our communities, other people and the planet. We know that not every business can or should import products from overseas. We know that for those that do, customers need to want to buy fair trade products before it makes good business sense.

The goal of the Fair Trade Fair is to raise awareness in our community among consumers, business owners, students and others. Our buying power can make a big difference in the world. It can change people's lives in the best sense.
