Second, we have been able to improve our writing and reporting. Our community mentors have been key in helping our reporters find the best stories and the best way to tell those stories. Also on the aesthetic front, this is our first issue printed on standard tabloid paper. Printers tell me the whole industry went to this size a few years ago, but no one bothered to tell us, so we've been paying a premium for our larger page size. Now we can shop our print work around and make sure our advertisers and contributors are getting the most for their money.
